Facts about English Ivy:

- English ivy changes the natural succession patterns of forests.
- Ivy limits under story regeneration by blocking sunlight and shading out plants.
- The fast-growing ivy competes for water and nutrients.
- The shallow mat-like root system makes it a poor choice for erosion control.
- Provides hiding areas for rats and other vermin.
- Birds eat the berries and “plant” them in wooded areas.
- Can bring down tall trees by providing a heavy attached “sail” that wind can topple. By also preventing young trees from starting, it eventually creates an “ivy desert.”
